I was in Monterrey, Mexico visiting my parents for Thanksgiving last week. Near their condo, there is a park called Fundidora, one of my favorite places in the world to go run. It used to be a steel foundry and after the company went bankrupt, the city turned it into a public space. You can still see some of the stacks around, and it is a great place to be outside when living in the middle of a 4-million people city. Summer Tour 2020 - Overview



This year's family-friendly five-day bicycle tour features routes on roads, the Pere Marquette Trail and the White Pine Trail and the Cadillac Pathway for dirt trail riding, all from the convenience of a single camping location, Veteran's Memorial Park Campground in Marion, MI.

SummerTour is three bicycling tours in one:

- *Roads, routes and maps. Enjoy northern Michigan's rolling terrain.
- *Drive and ride the paved White Pine and Pere Marguette rail/trails.
- *Ride your own story. Grab your county maps and find your own adventure.

The tour begins on **Wednesday**, **July 15** and ends on **Sunday**, **July 19**, **2020**. Camping will be available starting on Tuesday, July 14 **after 4 PM** at no additional charge.

Daily routes will vary between 25 and 75 miles, with various options. The Sunday rides will be a shorter variety to allow for returning to camp, shower and check-out by 2 PM.

This is **primarily a tent camping tour**, with provision for some RVs (for an extra fee). Be ready to "Ride Your Own Story." Take your bicycle anywhere. Do your own thing. We'll be back in the same campground at the end of the day.

Included in the basic fee are tent camping facilities, route maps, SAG service, and meals. Dinners are Wednesday through Saturday, and breakfasts are Thursday through Sunday at the campground. Campground Hosts will help with questions and provide you with snacks in the afternoons, group campfires with S'mores and munchies some evenings.

Marion is wonderful for bicycling. The roads are good. Traffic is light. A good vacation in the saddle. Bicycle Michigan's heartland.

Tri-County Bicycle Association (TCBA) of Lansing, MI sponsors SummerTour. It is open to all capable interested bicyclists. The first **150** entries will be accepted.

Thank you to those who sent your thoughts about commuting. I'll share some of the interesting tidbits you shared, starting with places that have community services and classes:

- **MSU Bikes Service Center** (http://msu-bike-service-center.shoplightspeed.com). Located at MSU, they seem to mostly focus on repairs but their "Brake Room" offers a place for people to talk about "sustainable non-motorized transportation".
- **Lansing Bike Co-Op** (http://www.lansingbikecoop.org). At 1715 East Kalamazoo Street, they offer classes on bike repair and commuting, and other special topics. Personally, I wasn't aware of this place, but according to their website, they have a grant from the League of Michigan Bicyclists so they can offer some scholarships on the classes as well.

I appreciated your comments, specifically, on how to transport things while biking. Some of you mentioned backpacks as the preferred method (personally, I think that's the way I would go just because it'd be easier to get started, I think), but the use of panniers was also mentioned, and preferred by some of you. When we lived in Germany, I remember seeing both backpacks and panniers, as well as trailers. I'll add that when I see people with panniers, I automatically think -usually with some admiration and jealousy, even more when it's raining- that they're serious bike folks and don't play around.

As mentioned in the last CC, I'm more of a "I bike to workout or have fun" person, and while it's true that biking is not something I normally think of as a form of actual "normal" transportation, I suppose I'll start giving this some thought. We only fear what we don't know, right? So maybe if I start commuting to work once a week (not in this weather, let's not get ahead of ourselves!), it'll start becoming normal. My list of excuses is long, but I can see the potential.

And with that, I can jump to the next topic: Bike Tours. I will say, Michigan has given me the gift of getting excited about going on biking tours. From the couple of times I've done DALMAC, to rides around Leslie, Kalamazoo, and Holland, I am excited every time I get to do one or learn about another one I hadn't heard of before. The most recent one to come to my attention was one held this past September, the "Great Lake-to-Lake Trails Route #1 Inaugural Ride" **. Organized by the Michigan Trails and Greenways Alliance, this tour went from South Haven on Lake Michigan to Port Huron on Lake Huron, traveling 275 miles in 6 days. Sounds like fun. I've also heard great things about the Kal-Haven one, which is on my bucket list, as is the Summer Tour, advertised above. My favorites are definitely DALMAC (few things compare to riding up the Wall or going over the Mackinaw Bridge on a beautiful sunny day!) and the Holland 100 tour. The Michigan Mountain Mayhem might be a close contender for 3rd spot... but the hills. The Five-Boro tour in New York City was amazing, and I imagine it would have been even better had I had been riding my actual road bike instead of the 20-year old townie with a loose basket I was able to score at the last minute...

What are your favorite bike tours in Michigan? Have you done out-of-state/country tours? Any favorites? What are your thoughts on carrying your own bike vs. renting one?
